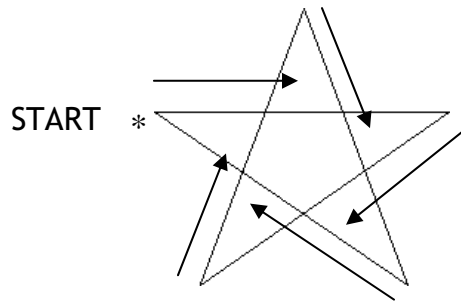


### Session Three

Today you and your child will paint five and six-pointed stars. The five-pointed star can be a golden yellow on a pale yellow background (see p.53) and you can add a touch of red to make it a warm orange color (or use the two different shades of yellow as I did). Follow this diagram when painting (or drawing) a five-pointed star:



You can use the same story for both kinds of stars and simply say that the stars in the heavens come in many different forms. Or you could use one of the following stories for the five-pointed star and for the six-pointed star you could say that this is the special star for the Jewish people, and the six points show us that God's love flows in all directions - North, South, East, West, up and down. The Star of David can be a rich dark blue on a pale blue background.



Go slow with these stars and have your child trace her finger above her paper a few times to carefully position the star and to get its proportions correct (no
